It is Easter! Christ is Risen we proclaimed on Sunday as we gathered in worship to hear the story of the empty tomb. In Matthew, Mark, and Luke, the telling of the Easter story is similar. Women go to the

tomb, discover it empty, and are met by an angel (or messenger) who tells them that Jesus is not "here" (in the tomb), but rather he is "out there" in the world. It is out in the world that they will meet him. What might that mean for us?

On Monday morning, the day after Easter, I made a pot of coffee, put my feet up, and began reading the newspaper. There, I read the obituary of Elwin Wilson. Elwin Wilson was an active Klu Klux Klan supporter who in 1961 participated in the brutal beating of John Lewis. John Lewis was an African-American Freedom Rider, a passionate worker for justice who later went on to become an Atlanta City Counselor and then Georgia congressman.

What drew me to the article was a 2009 picture of Representative Lewis and Mr. Wilson sitting side by side. They were together because in that year, Elwin Wilson in an attempt to make amends for decades of racial hatred, detailed his deeds in the local newspaper, and then called Mr. Lewis and admitted his guilt; "I'm the one that attacked you, I'm the one that beat you," he said. Then he asked for forgiveness, and Mr. Lewis forgave him. Later Mr. Lewis would say, "He was the very, very first to come and apologize to me."

I read this article and I was reminded of wise words I heard once, that "there are no permanent enemies." With Christ "out there" active in this world, surprises happen, still! Hearts are moved, those formerly blind come to see, people change. In this case a Klansman, haunted by a deep fear of the risen Christ's judgment, surprisingly repents. Then, in what may come as another surprise for those who can see the anger, but are blind to the passionate love of others that motivates some of the most courageous justice advocates; then, this former Klansman is given by Mr. Lewis the greatest gift that one human being can give to another, namely love, in this case love in the form of forgiveness and reconciliation.

This Monday morning obituary was for me a continuation of the Easter celebration from Sunday. For me, Easter means that there are no permanent enemies. For me, Easter means that I am called to live with a certain hopeful expectancy in what the risen Christ might do in any given person or situation. For me, Easter means that we are called to be partners with Christ is the healing, the reconciliation, the new creation that is God's dream for us and all creation.

A New England Synod Gathering at Trinity Lutheran Church, Worcester Saturday, May 4th

Here's what's scheduled:

Bishop Jim Hazelwood: "Where in God's name are we?"

The joy of the Easter season reminds us that God is very much at work in our world and in our lives, always loving, forgiving, and offering new begin-

nings and new life. This is not a God whom we have to seek, or be good enough for, or work towards. We have a God who *comes to us*- coming to live among us in our humanity (in Jesus), coming to us to forgive us, save us, and offer life.

But how exactly is God revealed to us? In this season of Easter, of resurrection and new life, how do you know God's presence in this world and in your life? Although God comes to us in countless ways, there are a few patterns in the Bible we can draw from.

- 1. God is often revealed by what God has done. For the Israelites, God is often revealed as "the God who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery." This is how the Israelites identified God. What has God done for you? We often know God by what God has done good in our lives. What are some things in your life for which you can give thanks to God?
- 2. God is often revealed to us by others. From the prophets, to the apostles, or the blind, sick, or demon possessed people Jesus healed- other people are often responsible for helping people realize God's presence and actions. How is God present in community? From our church community during Sunday morning worship, to friends and family, to strangers we meet on the street- God is present in all of these situations. How do we know God's presence in our relationships?
- 3. For the Christian church, God is most revealed in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. What does this mean to you? How does Jesus reveal God to you? God also comes to us in the sacraments of Baptism and Communion. How do you experience God in these?

Of course, this is hardly a complete list of the ways we experience God. After all, God is always finding ways to surprise us and be known to us in a new way, and I invite you to consider how you might be aware of God's presence in your life as we journey through Easter!

Book Recommendation

During Lent, a group of about a dozen of us engaged in Marcus Borg's, <u>The Heart of Christianity</u>. This book served as a good dialogue partner, helping us to glimpse some of what arising out of what is being named Emergence Christianity.

For those looking for another good read, (and a more "Orthodox" one) I strongly suggest Simply Christian, Why Christianity Makes Sense by N.T. Wright. You can find hundreds of favorable reviews on Amazon.com. Here are a few words from one reviewer that I find helpful:

At its core, then, the "faith" to which the Bible calls us is essentially trusting in a God who has revealed himself in history, who has begun, through Jesus' death and resurrection, to redeem the world and transform it into his kingdom, who invites us into to an intimate relationship with him, who demands that we become all that we were created and meant to be, who forgives us when we fall short of that mark, and who invites us to play a significant role in moving forward his plan for the world. For Wright, Christian faith is not just a matter of spiritual feelings that are quite independent of what we say and do. It makes demands upon us that can only be met in the realm of thought and behavior.

As C. S. Lewis did in his fiction, "Simply Christian" persuasively invites its readers to recognize that there is a transcendent reality that impinges on our ordinary world, that the God who rules this realm has made himself known in history and continues to do so, that we are part of his plan to renew his creation, and, consequently, that what we think and do has cosmic significance.

First Evangelical Lutheran Church Communion Bread Recipe

The communion bread that we eat is made by those in the community willing to do so. We welcome others sharing in this ministry! If you would like to try it, follow the recipe and instructions below. Then tell us in the church office so we're aware of your gift. Thank you.

Ingredients:

6 cups white flour ½ cup brown sugar 1 Tbsp. salt 2 tsp. baking soda 2 tsp. baking powder 1 Tbsp. cinnamon ¼ cup honey ½ cup shortening 2 cups water

Directions:

- 1. Mix together all dry ingredients
- 2. Mix in separately one at a time honey, shortening and water
- 3. Knead for 10 minutes on floured surface
- 4. Divide dough into 4 pieces and roll out 1/8" thick
- 5. Cut in approximately 6" diameter circles
- 6. Place on ungreased cookie sheet and bake at 350 degrees for approximately 10 minutes do not overbake!
- 7. Allow to cool
- 8. Wrap each bread airtight in saran wrap
- 9. Store in kitchen freezer it is best to store inside a freezer bag to maintain freshness.

World Malaria Day

The ELCA Malaria Campaign is starting work in Uganda – but help is needed.

In Uganda, thousands of children die each year from malaria – a preventable and curable disease. The entire population is at risk of malaria, but less than 50 percent are protected by preventable measures like insect-treated bed nets and mosquito spraying.
